
Training and Workforce Development System

Performance Report 2025









Training and Workforce Development System:

This document provides a summary of the performance of Tasmania's training and workforce development system, submitted under the Training and Workforce Development Act 2013 s6.1.(c).

The Performance Report demonstrates Tasmania's contributions towards the National Skills Agreement outcomes framework and the strategic priorities of the Tasmanian Skills Plan. Tasmania's training and workforce development system has continued to support skills for jobs, learner success and a strong, more connected system through 2024. Some apprentice and trainee measures have declined as the effects of covid stimulus subsides and activity returns to longer-term averages.

Skills for jobs

Building a skilled workforce will place Tasmania in the best position to deliver outcomes for the Tasmanian economy and community.


